'Highway Stay Way From My Door,' Say 8 Who Favor Alternate

A large citizens group in Trumbull and surrounding areas have been busy this past week interviewing residents who will be affected if Route 1 or 2 is selected to complete plans to attend the public hearing by the State Highway commission on the issue at a date and time still to be announced. FRANK D. OBIESKI, 270 Lake-side drive: "The only route which will benefit the citizen of Bridgeport is route 3, the one selected by the city officials. Any other choice will cost the city revenue it can ill afford to lose and add greatly to the problems of redevelopment which is a must if Bridgeport is to survive as a major city."



RAY RICH, 375 Griffin avenue: "I think alternate 3 should be the road through Bridgeport since it would spare the best residential sections of town. And with a few minor changes it would spare most of the industrial plants, too. Also it will relieve much of going to and coming home traffic on Boston and North avenues."



VERA PIXLEE, 40 Pinepoint drive: "I don't see the object of routes 2 or 1 because they would tear down the best residential sections in Bridgeport. Knowing how badly we need and want redevelopment, I see no reason for tearing down the new and leaving the old. Route 3 with a few modifications would really help the city's redevelopment."



JULIUS GROSSMAN, owner of Dolphman's Sportswear Inc., 245 Housatonic avenue: "My manufacturing plant is on alternate 3 and my home is on alternate 2 and I say take my plant, but not my home. In other words, I would rather lose my business, because Bridgeport and this particular part of town are contributing very little toward industry anyway. I'm for alternate 3."

Marooned Men Saved by Tug

WESTPORT—Two duck hunters, temporarily marooned on an island off Compo beach, were rescued yesterday at 10:30 a. m. by a dredging company tug.

Police said the two men, Joseph Suarez, 35, of 8 Imperial road, Wilton, were headed for Cokenoe island at about 6 a. m. but failed to complete the voyage because of choppy water.

They said they pulled into Sey-

mour's point about a half mile off Compo beach where they were stranded. A shorefront resident spotted the hunters' plight and called police.

Police notified the New England Dock and Dredge company representatives who used their tug to take the men off the island and tow the boat to shore.

The dredging firm is presently filling in sand at Compo beach.

It has a firm drinking water supply and automatic flushing.
